that Grieg needed the folksongs.
He loved them & glorified them

every lover of Grieg ought of course

Ought to do what he can to break down such a silly ignorant idea.

I adore every kind, form, period & style of Grieg's genius, & often each branch of his art appears dearest to me at one time or another.

Why I have played the Slåtter mostly is ~~not~~ because my interpretative powers are of a limited nature & the Slåtter most like me on my most fortunate & cabable side. But, ikkedsom mindre, I had, even before our dear letter, fully determined to do in Norway a Grieg group with no folk music settings in it, & to this I am fondly looking forward.

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As for "Jon Västafors Språngdans"
it was out & away the most
